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16	This current motion shows that before the filing of the information, the magistrate		
17	committed Wesson for trial without reasonable and probable cause ¹ on counts one to nine		
18	of the information, the homicide counts.		
19	Far from showing a reasonable suspicion that Marcus Wesson did the homicides in		
20	this case, the preliminary examination transcript actually shows that one of the deceased,		
21	Sebhrenah April Wesson, ² committed an eight-person multiple murder, and then she		
22	committed suicide. The preliminary examination transcript does not provide any cause		
23	for the Defendant, Marcus Delon Wesson, to be committed to trial.

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II. Wesson May Soon Have Additional Motions.

This section is included because only one date, which has now passed, was set for moving papers (May 11, 2004), responding papers (May 18, 2004), and motions—hearing (May 20, 2004).

This is the first of multiple motions that Wesson may file attacking the defective information filed in this case, or raising other issues. For planning purposes, the defense believes it should formally advise the court and the prosecution of the range of possible motions.

If Wesson does file additional motions, he will, naturally, ask the court to set appropriate dates for moving and responding papers, and hearing dates.

If necessary, the defense will also move for continuance of the trial, to prepare these motions, and to have them heard. The defense may also move for continuance of the trial for other reasons as well.

The defense is still researching whether additional "995" motions on other aspects of the information should be filed, but has been unable to conclude these motions are meritorious, and then to prepare them, in the time between superior court arraignment and the date set for filing motions, yesterday, May 11, 2004.

Wesson cannot determine whether to file a non-statutory motion to dismiss some or all of the counts in the information based on the prosecution's having made inadequate discovery before the preliminary examination, until the prosecution provides Wesson

substantially all of the discovery that he sought in his pre-prelim Discovery Motion. So far the prosecution has still provided Wesson only a fraction of that material. Among the items still not provided are the witness-interview audios and videos, and the results of scientific tests.

The defense has determined that it should defer filing any motions concerning the searches and seizures in this case until the issue of sealing the search warrants is settled.

The defense has made an additional, post–prelim, informal discovery request of the prosecution, and has not yet determined whether it will be necessary to file a formal motion to compel discovery.⁴

The defense has also not yet determined whether to move for a change of venue. Other motions, not mentioned here, are also possible.

III. Facts Shown At The Preliminary Hearing Relevant To This Motion, And Analysis.

A. Summary

The deaths occurred on the day of two simultaneous confrontations at Wesson's home. One confrontation was between two branches of Wesson's extended family. The other was confrontation was between Wesson's family and Fresno Police officers.

During the last part of the confrontations, Police Officers observed Wesson entering his home's southeast bedroom. Police evacuated everybody from all other parts

of the house, then exited the front door themselves, and surrounded the home. Wesson remained in the room for over an hour.

Some family members told police afterwards, but did not tell police at the time, that they heard gunshots. The police, who surrounded the house the whole time Wesson was in that room, never heard any gunshots.

When Wesson exited the home, police entered the southeast bedroom and found nine bodies, some still warm and with uncoagulated blood: seven children in a single pile, a teenager, whose body was partly on top and partly to the side of the pile and a 26-year-old, Sebhrenah April Wesson, whose body was partly on top of the pile and the teenager and partly to the side.⁵

Wesson, the evidence showed, is a deeply religious man, who conducted intense prayer sessions at home, whose children were home—schooled, and who allegedly had illegal sexual relations (including causing pregnancies) with many of his female children and relatives. The evidence also showed that for the past decade, Wesson repeatedly talked to his family about killing the children and committing suicide if the government tried to break the family up.

Although Wesson is now charged with these murders, the evidence also showed that in fact they were eight murders committed by his daughter Sebhrenah, who then committed suicide.

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Some fifteen people¹⁷ descended on the Wesson home, 761 West Hammond, Fresno¹⁸, at about 2:00 p.m.¹⁹ on March 12, 2004.²⁰ They were friends and relatives²¹ of Ruby Wesson²² and her sister, ²³ Sofina Solorio, also known as Sofie Solorio.²⁴

They came to support Ruby and Sofina.²⁵ Ruby and Sofina were there to demand custody of their two seven–year–old children.²⁶ Ruby's daughter was Aviv Dominique Wesson, and Sofina's son was Jonathan St. Charles Wesson.²⁷

Jonathan and Aviv had lived in the Wesson household since birth.²⁸ Sebhrenah, Marcus's daughter, was also a resident of the Wesson household.²⁹

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This sudden arrival of people was a surprise to Marcus Wesson,³⁰ and, therefore, probably, also a surprise to the entire Wesson household.

On arrival, Sofina saw Marcus Wesson, and his sister–in–law's daughter Rosie Solorio,³¹ and his daughters, Elizabeth Breani Kina Wesson,³² and Sebhrenah.³³

Sofina went inside the house, and saw Jonathan in a bedroom. ³⁴ Sofina grabbed Jonathan and began to exit the bedroom. ³⁵ Rosie screamed, grabbed Jonathan away from Sofina, and took him to the southeast bedroom. ³⁶ This is the bedroom where the murders–suicide eventually occurred. Sofina then gained access, herself, to the southeast bedroom. ³⁷

Sebhrenah was in that bedroom at that time.³⁸

Once Rosie got in, arguing and fighting ensued; the scene becomes chaotic.³⁹

Sofina saw five or six of the children in the room initially, with Elizabeth Jr.

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Sofina was not able to get Jonathan back, 41 and Rosie pushed Sofina out of the bedroom.42

The door shut, and Sofina ran back and pushed it open. 43

When she did that, she saw Sebhrenah "in a portion of the room digging in a leather bag that may have been the same leather bag that Marcus Wesson keeps his firearms."44

At this time, Marcus Wesson was still at the front door, and Sofina talked to him: "[H]e still wanted her and the girls to try to talk things over I [Officer Ochoa, the testifying officer] believe he [Marcus Wesson] was going to tell her that she [Sofina] was able to have her child back and they were having some type of conversation at that point."45

Sofina then saw talk between Rosie Solorio and Kiani Wesson, with Marcus Wesson. "The girls said 'Dad, should we?" And Marcus says 'no." "46 There was nothing else said or done to explain this exchange. Certainly, however, that was not an order to kill. If it had anything to do with killing, it was the opposite

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Serafino Wesson, a son of Marcus Wesson, then entered the house, which caused a further round of confusion and conversation.⁴⁷

Sofina exited the house, and did not reenter. 48

Sofina then walked down the driveway, to Marcus Wesson's bus, to talk; she also got a phone call.⁴⁹ The length of time this took was not stated.

When Sofina's attention returned to the house, she did not see Marcus Wesson.⁵⁰ It was about this time that Wesson, who had been at the doorway of the house the entire time so far, ⁵¹ then went into the house, into the southeast bedroom.⁵²

Sofina ran to the house–entrance, and saw Elizabeth Wesson (not Elizabeth, Jr., who died that day, but the Elizabeth who is Marcus Wesson's wife), Kiani Wesson, Rosie Solorio, and Serafino all walking out calmly, but with a look or horror, or a blank look, on their faces.⁵³

Serafino said, "I think Dad killed – Dad shot Lizzie [Elizabeth Jr.] and Sebhrenah." ⁵⁴ (While the magistrate admitted that statement as being spontaneous, ⁵⁵ by its terms, it reflects only what Serafino thought, not what he knew. If the police interviewed Serafino afterward, the results of that interview were not introduced at the

prelim. As already noted, Serafino's statement also does not square with the physical evidence, which shows that Sebhrenah had committed suicide.⁵⁶)

Wesson remained in the Southeast bedroom for over an hour and twenty minutes,⁵⁷ while the police officers assembled a negotiating team and a SWAT team.⁵⁸

Eventually, however, Wesson walked out on his own, and surrendered peacefully.⁵⁹

Officers then entered the house and discovered several bodies (eventually, nine) in the southeast bedroom. There was uncoagulated blood, and several bodies were still warm. 60

No admissions or confessions by Marcus Wesson were introduced at the Preliminary Hearing. His version, if he gave one, of what happened in the southeast bedroom, whether anybody was even alive when he entered it, was not introduced at the prelim.

There was evidence at the Preliminary Hearing that Marcus Wesson, over the last decade, talked repeatedly to his family about killing the children, and committing suicide,

if the police ever came to break up the family. 61 Marcus Wesson did own at least one gun. 62

But there was evidence at the Preliminary Hearing that Marcus Wesson never really intended to carry this out.

Wesson's daughter Gypsy Wesson⁶³ said that she never thought this plan would go through, because law enforcement has contacted them in the past, and nobody died.⁶⁴

Gypsy, although a daughter, would apparently have no reason to lie or shade things in Marcus Wesson's favor. She is one of the alleged victims in the sex-offense counts, 65 and she ran away from home around July 2003, less than a year earlier. 66

There was also evidence at the Preliminary Hearing that Marcus Wesson was quite serious about letting the mothers, Ruby and Sofina, take custody of their children.

Marcus Wesson had previously said that if people like Ruby and Sofina left the home, their children must stay until they were seven years old. Both children were now older than seven, so now would be the time for them to go.

The prosecution never got tired of introducing this evidence. Sample pages include, e.g., PHT pages 93, 94, 100, 106, 107, 108, 143, 160, 161, 162, 196, 206, 304, 305

that, and he was trying to have this worked out.⁶⁸ He just did not want it to happen in this manner.⁶⁹

The Preliminary Hearing Transcript shows that Marcus Wesson was agreeing to

It is understandable that people with whom children have lived since birth would not want to suddenly give them up, even to their mothers. Of course, it is also understandable that the children's mothers would want them back. And wrenching children out of the household and family they have known all their lives can cause deep emotional trauma.

It makes perfect sense, therefore, that Marcus Wesson would want to calm both groups down, and have them talk together to see if this could be worked out.

When did the nine people die? It must have been quite recent, because at least much blood was uncoagulated, and at least some bodies were still warm. (There was no scientific evidence introduced about the time of death.)

Yet, the police heard no gunshots the entire time.

Did these nine people die when there was a great noisy commotion inside the house, when muffled gunshots would be less likely to be heard? If so, Marcus Wesson is obviously innocent because he was in the doorway the whole time.

Or did they die when Marcus Wesson was in the southeast bedroom, nobody else is in any other room, police have surrounded the house, and are aware that he may have a gun, so that nine gunshots, even muffled ones, are surely going to attract police attention? That seems so unlikely that it is essentially impossible.

Although no police officer heard gunshots, Ruby, Sofina, Brandy (a sister to them both), and Kiani, all said they heard sounds that they thought may have been gunshots, so their statements must be evaluated.

What Kiani heard is analyzed first. Kiani said that after that after she heard this sound, everybody started screaming, and that influenced her in deciding this was a gunshot. Kiani was inside the house, but she was also uncertain of the time frame. Significantly, this was about the time that Sebhrenah appeared at the door of the Southeast bedroom, and called out to Kiani to come in. If, indeed, Kiani did hear a shot, surely that was a shot fired by Sebhrenah!

Ruby said that she heard six shots, when she was at the back of the bus on the driveway.⁷² But she did not mention these shots during her first interview with police, only during her second interview.⁷³ Moreover, she was, by her own admission, screaming, and, it appears, hysterical, at the time.⁷⁴ Ruby's excitable state of mind is also shown by the bizarre happening just minutes earlier, when her own mother, Rosemary Solorio, punched her in the stomach!⁷⁵

Brandy Sanchez, a sister to Sofina and Ruby, ⁷⁶ was also present during the incident. She also said that after Serafino, Kiani, and Rosie left the house, while she,

Brandy, was running back by the end of the bus in the driveway, she heard two muffled or very low pops in rapid succession, one right after the other.⁷⁷

The bus, where Ruby and Brandy allegedly heard shots, was a distance away from the house. But the time frame they give for hearing these sounds seems like the very time that officer, Nelson, was actually inside the house, calling out to Wesson in the Southeast bedroom. Nelson remained in the house for two or three minutes, but he did not hear any sounds or noises coming from the southeast bedroom.

Perhaps Ruby and Brandy heard these sounds later, when Officer Nelson went around the side of the house, and pulled out nailed-boards from the picket fence, so officers could view the house better. When pulled, those boards make a loud creaking sound!⁸⁰

Whatever Ruby and Brandy heard at that distance from the house, they could not have been gunshots, since the police officers stationed around the house and listening, did not hear them.

Sofina also reported, later, that she heard what she believed were two gunshots, one right after the other, when she was outside screaming.⁸¹ But she said she was next to a police sergeant at the time.⁸² Yet, as noted, no police officer reported hearing any gunshots.

And no police officer reported that any of these four, or anybody else, came up to them at the time and said they were hearing, or had just heard, gunshots.

In short, it is impossible that gunshots were heard by two people distant from the house but not heard by trained listeners inside or right outside the house. It sounds equally impossible that gunshots were heard by a person standing next to a police sergeant, but they are not reported to the sergeant, and the sergeant himself doesn't seem to hear them. Did Kiani hear a shot that nobody else did? Only if that shot was the last one, the one of Sebhrenah, committing suicide.

IV. The Law.

The basic law is well settled. The famous Rideout standard is still the basic law.

An information will not be set aside or a prosecution thereon prohibited if there is some rational ground for assuming the possibility that an offense has been committed and the accused is guilty of it.⁸³

In considering the motion, Rideout teaches,

A reviewing court may not substitute its judgment as to the weight of the evidence for that of the magistrate, and, if there is some evidence to support the information, the court will not inquire into its sufficiency. [Citations

omitted] Every legitimate inference that may be drawn from the evidence must be drawn in favor of the information.⁸⁴

But the inferences the court draws from the record must be reasonable. Just as the court cannot rely on guesswork, speculation, or conjecture, *Birt v. Superior Court* (1973) 34 Cal.App.3d 934, 938, so too, surely, the court cannot rely on the inherently impossible.

In *Birt*, the female defendant's fingerprint was found on a movable object, a cigarette lighter, located in a rented truck that was abandoned at a burglary scene after two males fled. The court said this was not sufficient to hold the defendant to answer to burglary.

In our case the evidence is even weaker then in *Birt*. In our case, if the nine people were murdered while Wesson was at the front door, then Wesson is obviously innocent. He could not have fired the gun. He was being listened to the whole time by police officers, and he was not heard to have ordered the murders. Nor did he aid or abet them in any way; on the contrary he tried to settle the matter peacefully.

Nor is it possible that the fatal shots were fired after he entered the southeast bedroom. There was only silence at that time. No police officer heard any gunshots. If indeed Ruby, Sofina, Brandy, or Kiani did hear sounds, they could not have been gunshots. Not when the trained listeners heard nothing.

There is no rational basis to believe that Wesson murdered these nine people. His daughter Sebhrenah murdered eight people, and then she killed herself.
